## Persistence – the Inability to Give Up

Paul (so recently Saul, the Persecutor) was persistent. He said, "Let no one cause me trouble, for I bear on my body the marks of Jesus" (Galatians 6:17, NIV). A polite way of saying, "Don't mess with me!" Sure enough, he had the marks. The first time he was stoned (can you imagine surviving a stoning even once, let alone again?), his friends thought he was dead. But they got him up and—foolish or stubborn man that he was, he went right back into the city (Acts 14). He went on to other cities to be stoned *again*, beaten, publicly humiliated, and shipwrecked—once or twice. Maybe Paul thought of giving up and joining the faculty of Hebrew University. But he didn't, or maybe couldn't.

Paul had what it takes.

What was that "it"? We start out with a vision. We commit. Then we run intoobstacles: Students who meet with us month after month and never say, "Yes" to the Lord. Churches that love the vision, but never sign on. Major and minor donors who love the work, but never write the check.

Vision is not enough. Commitment is not enough. It can be squashed down so deep under disappointments and frustrations, that we caneasily jettison commitment and give great justification for doing so.

The "it" has to be more than the vision, more than the commitment. I think the reason Paul persisted through all the stuff thrown at him, (which most of us will never ever face), was because of the Man he met on a road. Paul knew about the Cross. The road he was on would not be free of physical or emotional pain. It would involve adversity, discouragement, failure, heartache, and disappointment. It all seemed to bring him closer to Jesus. He told the people at Philippi, "I can do everything through him who gives me strength" (Philippians 4:13, NIV). He told the people at Corinth, "... be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your toil is not in vain in the Lord" (1 Corinthians 15:58, NIV). He told the Galatians, "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up" (Galatians 6:9, NIV).

That's persistence, the inability to even think of giving up!
