Counselors I know are still way overburdened and overbooked. It almost seems like half the population is suffering some form of post-traumatic stress disorder. Therefore, start your contacts with donors and potentials donor using pastoral care.

The second thing is to be thankful for how God provided through your donors in 2020.

Third, be ready to answer their questions about how ISI's ministry did at reaching international students during the COVID pandemic. We did well, by the grace of God. I have never seen so many unique and effective modifications of our ministry approach.

And even though the students numbers were down, the depth of discipling relationships was up!

Fourth and finally, if you are like me, you did very little travel to visit donors in 2020. As the virus winds down (hopefully), more and more people get vaccinated, and herd immunity grows, get out and visit your supporters in 2021. There's nothing like the personal touch to let them know you care and are thankful. Remember to take along a small gift as a token of your appreciation.
